WHO IS MOST AT RISK?

CONFLICT & VIOLENCE
Children exposed to armed conflict, terrorism, and community violence.
- 


DISPLACEMENT & REFUGEE SETTINGS
Children forced to flee their homes face instability, exploitation, and loss of services.
- 


FRAGILE HEALTH & NUTRITION
Children facing malnutrition, disease outbreaks, and limited access to health care.
- 


ADOLESCENT GIRLS
Girls at heightened risk of GBV, child marriage, and barriers to education.

LOSS OF ESSENTIAL SERVICES
Children losing access to education, protection, health, nutrition, WASH and psychosocial support.



GLOBAL IMPACT: WHERE CUTS WILL BE FELT MOST

SEVERE IMPACT
Sub-Saharan Africa
Severe humanitarian crises, conflict, disease outbreaks, and malnutrition threaten millions of children.

HIGH IMPACT
MENA & Fragile States
Displacement, instability, and economic collapse weaken services and increase risks for children.

MODERATE IMPACT
Latin America & Caribbean
Children face learning loss, protection risks, and rising violence with limited support.
- 

STRATEGICALLY MAINTAINED SUPPORT
Indo-Pacific & Select Partners
Investments continue in education, health, nutrition, and protection linked to regional stability and strategic competition.
